OBITUARY FOR THE LATE MS NTOMBIZODWA DORIS SIKHOSANA (1942 - 2023)

Doris (Mababi) Ntombizodwa Sikhosana, uzalwa uMasuku benoMaMsomi Josifina Sikhosana abangasekho. Babusiswa ngezingane eziyisithupha, Doris engowokugcina kwabo.

Wazalelwa endaweni yasOphepheni eHighflats. KwaZulu Natal. Waqala amazinga aphansi emfundo Ophepheni primary School. Waqhubeka wafunda, Sobantu High School e Pietermazitzburg. Waqala ukusebenza kuma office abammeli eDurban, akwa-Griffiths Mxenge. Okuyilapho angenela khona ezombusazwe.

She dedicated her entire life as a freedom fighter.

She worked in the ANC underground with various leaders of the ANC whilst remaining the country when these leaders were forced into exile. She also created a link between the Union leaders and the ANC underground to ensure that the trade unions understood their role and formed a firm foundation in the struggle for liberation as part of the Congress Movement.

Comrade Doris went to exile in Swaziland, Mozambique, Tanzania and Angola.

She continued to work for the African National Congress on her return from exile. Due to her hard work and contribution in the Movement, she was elected to the National Executive Committee of the ANC Women's League at its first National Conference inside the Country. Consequently, she was recognised by the organisation for her excellent service.

She also worked tirelessly in improving the lives of the people in several communities though Community Based Organisations.

She worked as a community activist with churches through DIAKONIA and trade Union Movement. The communities through CBOs and Faith Based Organisations and NGOs became a vibrant movement of grassroots mobilisation to work in partnership with government in sociolo-economic transformation.



This made ordinary people to appreciate that their role was not to wait for government to deliver services but they had to take part on matters affecting their lives. This made the struggle for freedom meaningful to communities. Comrade Doris focussed on training and capacity building for traditional leaders such as aMakhosi, iziNduna and aMagoso, some of whom became elected Counsellors and champions of local development initiatives in townships and informal settlements and rural areas. She received accolades through her community work.

She contributed in creating structures for communities to improve conditions in informal settlements in Durban, kwaMakhutha, iNanda and Amaoti. She fought against illegal evictions and encouraged communities to fight for community development and building of social amenities.

She believed in nonracialism in her daily life and mobilised across different communities working closely with leaders in the Natal Indian Congress.

She was the founding Director of the Community Internship Programme (CIP) in the early '90s when she returned to South Africa from exile. The CIP was based at the Howard College campus of the University of Natal (now University of KwaZulu–Natal) and encouraged university students to use knowledge and skills gained in their studies for the benefit of their home communities.

In the late 90s and due to increasing demand for the organisation's services by both students and communities, the CIP expanded its scope and became the Community Internship and Development Centre (CIDC).



These programmes started in KwaZulu–Natal but soon expanded to other provinces around the country and to other countries including Mozambique, Zimbabwe and Angola. This led to the formation of an international coalition that became known as the Community Organisations Regional Network (CORN).

The CIDC's international impact extended beyond the African continent when the organisation partnered with the US-based One World Family (OWF) organisation. OWF raised funds in the USA which were then utilised to fund programmes that addressed the plight of orphans caused by HIV and AIDS (which was still rampant at the time), abused women and vulnerable children in areas such as Clermont, KwaMashu and KwaXimba, among others.

Keenly aware of the link between poverty and disease, she initiated the Anti-Hunger Campaign, with the slogan: 'Qed'indlala, Nqand'ingculazi'. The campaign, which included the provinces of KZN, Limpopo, Mpumalanga, Eastern Cape, Northern Cape and Free State, sought to encourage the participation the of rural communities, particularly women, in programmes to reduce poverty while fighting disease at the same time.

She was elected as a Member of Parliament and served with dedication and was honoured by the presiding officers in National Assembly.

She was transferred to become Member of KwaZulu–Natal legislature and served in the Premier's portfolio committee where her contribution was exemplary. She was the Chairperson of the Standing Committee of the Quality of Life for Women, Children, Youth, Persons with Disabilities, and Senior Citizens. In this portfolio, she took the time to represent communities, especially the vulnerable groups as a public representative and a champion for development in priority areas identified by the Committee: Unemployment of youth, child labour, women and children abuse, Women empowerment, and early childhood development.

She is survived by 2 sons – Thulasizwe and Funizwe and 4 grandchildren. She will be dearly missed.
