With these multiple threats, each day your work reminds us not only to be committed to institutionalising peace, but to become activists, agents and peacebuilders in our provinces, municipalities, communities and homes.

We congratulate ACCORD on reaching this significant milestone, and for having become the largest conflict management organization in Africa and one of the best in the world.

We are proud that even as you spread your wings, you remain rooted in KwaZulu-Natal where you sharpened your teeth in conflict management when we too battled political violence in the 80s and 90s.

May God continue to grant you as the Board, Executive and Staff the wisdom of Solomon to grow even stronger over the next 30-years.
