PCA MANDATE IN THE HIV AND AIDS, TB AND STI MULTISECTORAL RESPONSE

- Coordinate the development of the Provincial and District Implementation plans for HIV, TB and STIs every five years
- Deliberate and recommend changes to the plans after each mid-term review
- Monitor the progress being made quarterly in the achievement of the targets and make recommendations for addressing underachievement of the objectives of these plans
- Deliberate and make recommendations on major policy proposals under consideration by government departments
- Advocate for policy proposals from civil society, provincial and local governments, the private sector and technical experts and partners
- Foster accountability among all structures, partners and stakeholders in the response.
- Mobilize resources for the response

AIDS COUNCILS STRENGTHENING

- Capacity building workshops conducted for District AIDS Councils and Local AIDS Councils Teams on coordination, integration and mainstreaming
- The purpose of the workshops was to promote leadership and shared accountability for a sustained multi-sectoral response to HIV, TB and STIs in KwaZulu-Natal.
- 354 stakeholders reached across all 11 districts
- 6 districts reached with orientations for Political Leaders on HIV, TB, STIs and GBV response conducted in collaboration with COGTA- iLembe, Zululand, Amajuba, uMzinyathi, eThekweni and King Cetshwayo
- War room rapid assessments to determine their non functionality/functionality.

Highlights

- HIV testing reduced by 8% in Q3 2021/22 as compared to the 0,01% reduction for Q2 2021/22.
- 7 districts experiencing decreased numbers in testing- **eThekweni, Harry Gwala; iLembe; uGu; uMgungundlovu; uMzinyathi and Zululand.**
- Highest quarter on quarter **increase** by uThukela and highest **decrease** by eThekweni and uMgungundlovu.
- HIV positivity remains low but **iLembe** and **uMkhanyakude** districts with highest positivity yield.

Remedial Action

- Integration of HIV and TB testing with COVID 19
- Scale up index case testing
- Target hotspots for key populations, reach men through a comprehensive men’s health programme and youth through adolescent youth friendly services
- Provider Initiated Counselling and Testing should be offered at all facility entry points using HIV risk assessment tool

- eThekwini** and **uThukela** with highest **increases** in distribution quarter on quarter.
- uMkhanyakude, Harry Gwala and Zululand** with highest **decreases** in distribution quarter on quarter.
- Condoms distribution per male remained low.**

Remedial Action

- Intensify HIV campaigns and condom distribution
- Increase distribution support by Civil Society Organisations-NGOs CBOs, FBOs
- Accurately document numbers distributed at primary and secondary sites

- Continue implement a comprehensive men's health programs – Ikhosomba Lamajitha and Isibaya Samadoda
- Engaging influencers and gatekeepers to encourage men to circumcise

CHILD AND LEARNER PREGNANCY DIALOGUES & TEENAGE PREGNANCY SUMMIT

- Teenage pregnancy dialogues held in 7 districts- King Cetshwayo, uMkhanyakude, iLembe, uMzinyathi, Zululand, uMgungundlovu and eThekweni.
- Dialogues conducted in collaboration with of key departments (DOE, DSD and DOH), Civil Society, Office of the Premier units, District AIDS Coordinators and community members (parents and youth).
- A total of 700 participated in the dialogues across the 7 districts.
- Teenage Pregnancy Summit planned for August 2022

- **eThekwini and uThukela** remained with lowest adult viral load suppression rates.
- Viral load suppression rates in Children lower.
- **eThekwini** with lowest child viral load suppression rates at 12 months

Remedial Action

- Proper identification and tracking system for viral load taking
- Intensify literacy classes and case management

WORLD AIDS DAY (WAD) 2021 COMMEMORATION

- Province commemorated 33RD WAD on 1 December 2021 under the Theme “**Working Together to end Inequalities , AIDS, TB & COVID. Get Tested. Get Vaccinated. Adhere to Treatment**”
- Provincial commemoration held in eThekweni (estimated number of attendees 600 mainly youth).
- Hosted by the Premier as District Champion
- Supporting partners-CIPLA, TB HIV CARE, AFSA, TB HIV INVESTIGATIVE NETWORK, ETHEKWINI MAYOR’s OFFICE
- 9 districts commemorated WAD 2021. King Cetshwayo and iLembe did not commemorate.
- 6 district WAD commemorations were led by respective MEC Champions.
- Estimated number of people attending WAD commemoration 3200.



HIV AND AIDS, TB AND STIs BEHAVIOURAL CHANGE CAMPAIGNS

- Eight districts eThekweni, uMzinyathi, iLembe, uThukela, uMgungundlovu, Amajuba, uMkhanyakude and uGu conducted Behavioral Change Campaigns (BCC).
- District BCC led by MEC Champions, Mayors and Civil Society
- The aim is to bring back clients' loss to follow up, link them back to care and promote adherence
- An estimated 1800 community members participated across the districts.



TUBERCULOSIS (TB) TREATMENT

Highlights

- **uMkhanyakude** maintained achievement of 85% treatment success rate target.
- **uGu** with lowest treatment success rate.

Remedial Actions

- Integration of TB Screening with COVID 19
- Community mobilization and education at facility and community level on high TB prevalence and resistance
- Engage with all community structures to promote TB treatment adherence
- Collaborate with other community structures to communicate the importance of TB control

- Event was coordinated through PCA, led by MEC Nomusa Dube-Ncube, with MEC Nomagugu Simelane, MEC H Mavimbela, Ms Zulu – MPL, Civil Society Representatives led by Mr Patrick Mdletshe, Inkosi Zwane, US Consul General and other key stakeholders
- TB Blitz done at Taxi Rank; SUMITOMO Rubber factory was visited; Community Dialogue
- Programme was delivered to more than 680 communities
- Departments and Partners delivered services on site.
- All districts commemorated World TB Day.
- Milestones on TB Caucus were outlined by Legislature

REACHING ALL KEY AND VULNERABLE POPULATIONS 'No One is Left Behind'

ADOLESCENT GIRLS AND YOUNG WOMEN (AGYW)

- 84% (20742) of the targeted AGYW in King Cetshwayo and Zululand reached with HIV prevention programmes in Q3. In Q2-102% achievement and in Q1-74%.
- 83% (1764) of the targeted AGYW using PrEP
- 92% (146) of targeted AGYW linked to care

MALE SEXUAL PARTNERS OF AGYW

- 103% (6772) of the targeted MSP in King Cetshwayo and Zululand tested for HIV and received their test results in Q3. In Q2 129% achievement and in Q1-88%.
- 27% (16) of targeted MSP linked to care. Low linkage to care for MSP

ADLOSECENT AND YOUNG PEOPLE INTERVENTIONS

ADOLESCENT AND YOUNG PEOPLE (AYP) CHAMPIONS.

- Placed in 4 districts -uThukela, uMgungundlovu, eThekweni and Zululand from October 2021. They are responsible for
- Mobilizing young people and serve as youth representatives on AYP issues on HIV Prevention related matters at workshops, advisory committees, meetings and on task forces in the districts.
- Raising awareness and mobilizing peers for youth prevention programs
- Identify and collaborate with local stakeholders to support and actively participate in AYP HIV prevention programs
- Support organizations to develop youth friendly policies and procedures to create more opportunities for all young people
- All districts to implement AGYW comprehensive plan
- Implement DREAMS in 6 Districts
- **Intensify PrEP uptake – PrEP Indaba**
- Improve linkage to care through CHW's and linkage officers
- Intensify awareness campaign for key and vulnerable populations

ADOLESCENTS AND YOUNG PEOPLE INTERVENTIONS



YOUTH SUMMIT

- Strengthening the integration and maximizing the response was the focus of the summit.
- Young people exposed to different social, economic and health empowerment programmes available to them.
- Amplifying young people's voices one of the priorities of the summit.
- 150 young people attended from across the province.

PREP INDABA

- PrEP Indaba planned for May 2022. Indaba will be led by the DOH in collaboration with TB HIV Care Association.

ADOLESCENTS AND YOUNG PEOPLE INTERVENTIONS

GIRLS EMPOWERMENT PROGRAMME

- The girls' empowerment camp held in February 2022 in King Cetshwayo District.
- Girls brought together for team-building exercises, engagements on HIV prevention strategies, teenage pregnancy, sexual and reproductive health services, mental health and career guidance.
- The camp was attended by 50 AGYW from 5 local municipality in KCD.



SEX WORKERS

- 95% (5847) of the targeted Sex Workers in King Cetshwayo, uGu and Zululand reached with HIV prevention programmes in Q3. In Q2-105% achievement and in Q1-100%.
- 65% (266) of the targeted Sex Workers using PrEP
- 32% (32) of targeted Sex Workers linked to care. Low linkage to care for Sex Workers

MEN WHO HAVE SEX WITH MEN (MSM)

- 86% (5847) of the targeted MSM in King Cetshwayo, uGu and uThukela reached with HIV prevention programmes in Q3. In Q2-78% achievement and in Q1-71%.
- 11% (282) of the targeted MSM using PrEP
- 32% (32) of targeted Sex Workers linked to care. Low linkage to care for Sex Workers

PEOPLE WHO INJECT DRUGS (PWID)

- 1257 PWID in eThekweni and uMgungundlovu reached with a minimum package of services in Q3. this is above target by 103%. In Q2 101% achievement and in Q1-102%.
- 48% (233) of the targeted PWID in the 2 intervention sites tested for HIV and received their test results in Q3. In Q2 53% achievement and in Q1-62%.

LGBTQI

- LGBTQIA+ Implementation plan developed.
- Workshop with Municipal staff in uGu in March 2022 on stigma and discrimination mitigation.
- Revitalisation of uGu LGBTQIA+ sector in November 2021

ADDRESSING THE SOCIAL AND STRUCTURAL DRIVERS OF HIV, TB AND STIs, ‘A multi-department, multisectoral approach’

OVCY RECEIVING PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT SERVICES

Highlights

- A cumulative total of 227804 orphans and vulnerable children (OVCY) had received psychosocial support services by Q3.
- Districts with highest number of OVCY receiving psychosocial support services in Q3 1) **uMkhanyakude**; 2) **eThekwini**; 3) **Zululand**; and 4) **King Cetshwayo**.

Remedial Action

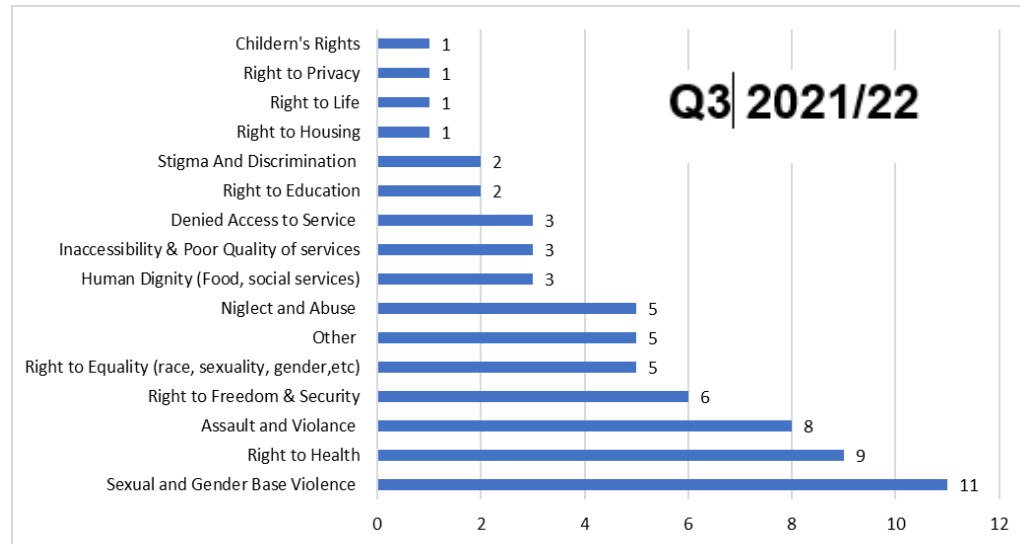
- Intensify implementation Social and Behaviour Change Programme- You Only Live Once – YOLO; CHOMMY, Family Matters!, Community Capacity Enhancement (CCE) and KeMoja substance abuse in all the 11 districts.
- Funded Non Profit Organisations implementing Social and Behaviour Change Programmes in -Amajuba, Harry Gwala, iLembe, uMzinyathi, uMgungundlovu, Zululand.
- Government to Government programme implementing YOLO and CHOMMY in eThekwini.
- Targeting OVCY through the risiha programme with a core package of services in all the 11 districts.

- A cumulative total of 7766 sexual assault cases seen in public health facilities by Q3. 5% increase in sexual assault cases seen at health facilities in Q3.
- 7 districts- **Amajuba, eThekwini, Harry Gwala, iLembe, uMkhanyakude, uThukela** and **Zululand** recording increased numbers in Q3
- 3 districts-**uMkhanyakude (36%), uMzinyathi (29%)** and **uThukela (25%)** with highest percentage increases in Q3.
- A cumulative total of 2370 child sexual assault cases seen in public health facilities by Q3. Children sexual assault cases increased by 6%.
- 6 districts- **Amajuba, eThekwini, Harry Gwala, King Cetshwayo, uMzinyathi** and **uThukela** recorded increases.

HUMAN RIGHTS VIOLATIONS RECORDED BY TYPE



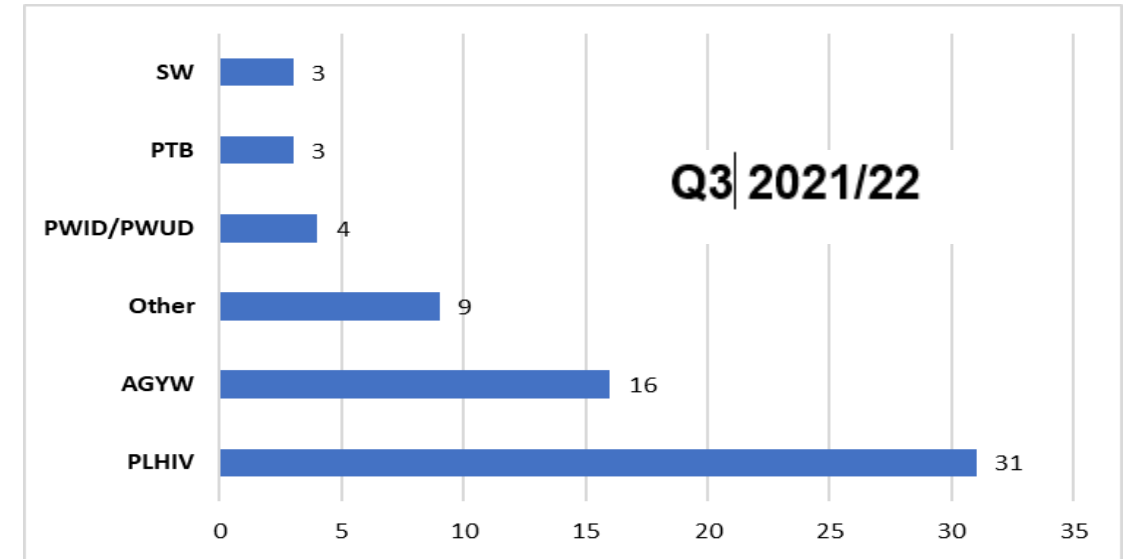

- 354 stakeholders reached across all 11 districts
- District Monitoring & Evaluation Task Teams revitalisation and establishment.

CIVIL SOCIETY RESEARCH SECTOR

- Research sector activity took place in February 2022.
- Different organisations doing research in the Province shared progress of research conducted in HIV and GBV.
- The resolution was to do more community- based research and involve community stakeholders.
- New Research Sector Leadership were elected.
