

- An estimated 2 500 community members participated.

DISTRICTS WAD COMMEMORATIONS

- All 11 districts held district WAD Commemorations as compared to 9 in 2021. These were held in varied dates between 01 December 2022 and 15 December 2022.
- A total of 10 672 community members participated as compared to 3 732 people in 2021.

1. Introduction and Context

World AIDS day (WAD) was first observed on the 1st of December 1988 when Health Ministers from around the world met under the auspices of the World Health Organization and agreed on the concept of WAD. Since then, WAD has been used to create an opportunity to pay special attention to, as well as show solidarity for the global fight against HIV and AIDS. The WAD 2022 marked the 34th year of its commemoration and contributed to:

- 1. Remembering people who passed on due to AIDS-related illnesses.
- 2. Raising public awareness about HIV and AIDS, as well as available prevention and treatment options.

As has been with the previous WAD commemorations, South Africa joined the rest of the world in commemorating WAD. South African National AIDS Council (SANAC) coordinated the planning and implementation of the National WAD commemoration and provided guidance to provinces through the respective Provincial Councils on AIDS (PCA). In KwaZulu-Natal, the PCA coordinated the commemoration with the support of the Provincial Council on AIDS Secretariat based at the Office of the Premier and the District AIDS Council Secretariats.

The WAD 2022 took place three years after the outbreak of the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. In this period, the Country employed various means in responding to COVID-19 in efforts to curb its devastating effects. It also took place in eight months after floods devastated some parts of the province. As such, KZN's WAD 2022 commemoration took into consideration:

- 1. Government response to COVID-19, HIV and TB integration.
- 2. Support provided to People Living with HIV (PLHIV) and sectors that were affected by floods.

2022 was also a milestone year in the Country's HIV, TB and STIs response as it marked the end of the 5-year plan NSP/PIP implementation period that commenced in 2017. The Country and the province took stock of the achievements, progress made, gaps and what needed to be done as the country moved towards the target of eliminating HIV as a public health threat in 2030. Having deferred the development of the new National Strategic Plan (NSP)/Provincial Implementation Plan (PIP) 2023-2028 and replaced it with a Catch-Up plan for 2022/23. The commemoration further provided an opportunity to review implementation and determine the province's performance toward the key targets of the Catch-Up plan.

2. World AIDS Day 2022 Theme

The theme for WAD 2022 in South Africa was "Equalize and Integrate to End AIDS."

Human figures in different shades, holding out their hands, touching at the cross section of the AIDS ribbon to demonstrate integration and equalisation.

The tale disintegrates just before the theme words to depict various challenges that still exist in the HIV response, necessitating the need to "equalise and integrate" in order to end AIDS by 2030.

The end of the tale of the ribbon is a solid line on the other side of the theme wording to demonstrate a solidified, equalised, and integrated HIV response.

10/11 districts displayed the theme prominently during the WAD.



3. Objectives & Expected Outcomes

Objectives of the WAD 2022 commemoration were as follows:

- 1. To strengthen the Undetectable=Untransmittable (U=U) campaign.
- 2. To raise awareness about HIV and AIDS as ongoing public health crises.
- 3. To promote screening & testing for HIV, TB and STIs.
- 4. To promote treatment adherence.
- 5. To promote prevention against the spread of HIV, TB and STIs.
- 6. To mitigate against stigma & discrimination.

- 7. To shine a spotlight on social & structural drivers (e.g. GBVF, Poverty etc)
- 8. To promote social behavior change, especially towards safer sex.
- 9. To encourage COVID-19 vaccination and other health services, especially to PLHIV and men.
- 10. To share information about implementation of 2017-2022 Provincial Implementation Plan.

EXPECTED OUTCOMES

- 1. Increased screening, testing and linkage to care for HIV, TB, STIs and other non-communicable diseases, thereby contributing to prevention of these diseases.
- 2. Improved adherence to treatment leading to improved treatment outcomes for HIV and AIDS, TB and non-communicable diseases.
- 3. Attainment of the 95-95-95 targets for HIV and TB.
- 4. Reduction in stigma and discrimination as well as other human rights violations.
- 5. Increased life expectancy.
- 6. Strengthening partnerships among SANAC sectors.
- 7. Ending HIV as a public health threat by 2030.

4. Focus and Approach

4.1 Focus

The province's focus was on the following:

- 1. Reflect with all stakeholders on KZN's journey in the implementation of the PIP 2017-2022.
- 2. Discuss moving forward the development of the new PIP 2023-2028. (Eliminating HIV as a Public health threat by 2030 and reaching other global targets such as 95-95-95)
- 3. Engage youth on the youth led PIP Stakeholders.
- 4. Put spotlight on tuberculosis, sexually transmitted infections, human rights, stigma and discrimination, marginalised populations, adolescents and young people etc.

4.2 Approach

The approached consisted of the following components.

- 1. Putting People living with HIV (PLHIV) at the centre of commemorations.
- 2. Using mass media and digital media platforms to relay key messages relating to the WAD campaign.
- 3. Provision of integrated comprehensive health and wellness services
- 4. Leveraging off existing campaigns and interventions particularly the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-based Violence campaign held in November and December.
- 5. Use of the Three-Pronged Strategy of: a) Build-up activities leading up to the World AIDS Day; b) Commemorating the main WAD event and c) Post-World AIDS Day activities.
- 6. Data collection and reporting using a set of WAD data collection tools.

5. Preparations

5.1National Level Meetings

Preparations for the Country wide WAD 2022 was coordinated and led by SANAC. The SANAC secretariat convened as series of meetings with stakeholders from all around the Country to provide guidance. The KZN Head of PCA Secretariat and other staff members attended these meetings. The meetings provided guidance/updates on the following among others:

- 1. The concept of WAD 2022 Campaign.
- 2. National theme.
- 3. Communication plan.
- 4. Venue for the National WAD commemoration.
- 5. Status of preparations for the National commemoration.
- 6. State of readiness by Provinces.

5.2Provincial and District Level Meetings

The PCA Secretariat coordinated planning meetings at Province level. Three planning meetings were held with stakeholders between October 2022 and November 2022. The meeting discussed the following:

- 1. Updates/feedback on National level meetings.
- 2. The Provincial concept paper on WAD.
- 3. Presentations on calendar of events by districts.
- 4. State of readiness by districts.
- 5. Data collection and reporting.

All districts further held planning meetings at various dates in November 2022.

6. Build-Up Campaigns

6.1Province Level Build-Up Activities

The main build-up campaigns continued to be the District Behaviour Change Campaigns (BCC) whose overall purpose was to mobilise and have those who had defaulted or had been lost to follow up get brought back to treatment. Other build up activities were as follows:

- 16 Days of Activism for non-violence against women and children campaign.
- Child and teenage pregnancy engagements.
- Oversight visit at iThembalantu in uMlazi.
- Revitalization of PLHIV support groups.
- Adolescent girls and young women Hub of Hope expansion
- Establishment of Ward AIDS Committees.
- Traditional Men's Parliament.

• Districts Youth Sector elections and induction.

Figure 2: Revitalisation of PLHIV Support Groups across the Province





Figure 3: District HIV, TB and STIs Behaviour Change Campaigns

6.2District Level Build-Up Activities

All districts held build-up events based on respective calender of events. The activities included the following:

- 1. Community mobilisation e.g door to door focussing on tracing treatment interuptors/defaulters and those lost to follow up for linkage back to care.
- 2. Anti-gender based violence and femicide activities e.g conducting dialogues targetting men and young boys, crime indabas and prayer sessions.
- 3. Operation MBO outreach activities providing communities with one-stop platform for services.
- 4. Sensitisation activities on key population to address stigma and discrimination as well as access to services.
- 5. Child protection awareness sessions.
- 6. Isibaya Samadoda activities.
- 7. PLHIV Support Group treatment literacy activities.
- 8. Campaigns to promote healthy lifestyles targeting men and young boys.
- 9. Social Cohesion and Moral Regeneration activities

A total of 8/11 (about 73%) district events were led by respective MEC Champions. District Mayors participated in 6/11 (about 55%) districts and Head of Departments in 4 of the 11 Districts i.e. 40%. uMgungundlovu was the only district where all the 3 Champions participated while only 1 Champion participated in uGu and eThekwini.

7.3 Stakeholder Participation and Support





- 6. Participation by Government Departments in the planning and provision of services during the WAD commemoration.
- 7. More community members were reached by services delivered through an integrated approach.

11. Recommendations

- 1. WAD should be commemorated across in all districts on 01 December, joining the rest of the Country and the World.
- 2. The concept of MEC District Champions leading WAD commemorations in their respective districts should be retained.
- 3. Participation in the planning of WAD by MEC Head of Ministry Offices should be more visible.
- 4. The District leadership led by the Mayor in their Capacity as Chairpersons of the District AIDS Councils should intensify their support in the planning of WAD in their respective districts.
- 5. The provision of integrated services should adopt the Operation MBO approach and ensure that Government departments providing services expands across the districts beyond the DOH and DSD.
- 6. The PLHIV Sector and other Civil Society should mobilise their membership to fully and actively participate in the planning of WAD commemorations.

12. Conclusion

Overall, KZN had successful WAD commemorations where all the 11 districts held WAD Commemorations as compared to 9 in 2021. Premier Nomusa Dube-Ncube led the Province's World AIDS Day (WAD) commemoration held in Amajuba District on 1 December 2022.

8 District WAD commemorations were led by respective MEC Champions as compared to 6 in 2021. Participation by both Government departments and Civil Society sectors also improved with 13 Government departments and 11 Civil Society Sectors forming part of the commemorations.

A total of 10 672 community members participated in the 2022 WAD, which was a threefold increase to the numbers that participated in 2021. This may be attributed to the mobilisation and that this was the first WAD commemoration taking place without any COVID-19 related restrictions. Community members had the opportunity to access a range of services that included health services and social services. As has been the practice, the province applied the three-pronged strategy of a) build up activities; b) holding the main event and c) post WAD activities.

Namuhla sizovuselelana ukuthi kusezandleni zethu ukuba sinqande ukubhebhetheka kwalo mashayabhuqe wesifo.

UHulumeni uzisabalalisile kuzona zonke izikhungo izinhlelo zokuthi silwe nalolu bhubhane. Umhlaba wonke akekho uhulumeni oqhamuke nohlelo oluyihawu lokuvikela isizwe ukwedlula uHulumeni wethu lapha eNingizimu Afrika.

SIBONGA UMSEBENZI OMUHLE

Kusemqoka-ke futhi ukuthi emcimbini onjengalona sibonge umsebenzi owenziwa yizinhlangano ezizimele, izinhlaka zomphakathi namavolontiya nje azimele emiphakathini, bonke abasebenza ngokungakhathali befundisa abantu nge-HIV/AIDS.

Umsebenzi wenu omuhle wokukhuthaza abantu ukuba bahlole isimo sabo bese beyamukela imiphumela namhlanje usuyabonakala. Namhlanje sikhuluma ngokuthi isifundazwe saKwaZulu-Natal sesihambe ibanga elide ekwehliseni ukusuleleka ngegciwane nokusabalalisa ama-ARV kubantu abaphila ne-HIV ne-AIDS.

Sesinabantu asebephile iminyaka eminingi bephila negciwane le-HIV/AIDS ngoba uma uzinakekela, uthatha imishanguzo uyaphila njengabo bonke abantu.

Noma sesilihambile igxathu elikhulu, nokho kusasikhathaza ukuthi baningi abantu abasasuleleka ngegciwane, ikakhulukazi intsha engamantombazane.

Uma silapha-ke emphakathini waseDanawozi eMajuba jikelele, sithi kumele sisukume sizibophezele ngokuvikela abesifazane, amantombazane nezingane.

NATIONAL AND PROVINCIAL HIV TARGETS

In terms of the National Strategic Plan, we aim to reduce new HIV infections from 270 000 to less than 100 000 per year; reduce TB infections from 450 000 to less than 315 000 per year, as well as to accelerate the province towards meeting the UNAIDS 90-90-90 targets.

KwaZulu-Natal is performing the uppermost despite having the highest burden in the country. We are well on course with our 95-95-95 targets.
